





## Violeta



Part picaresque adventure, part shrewd social commentary, *East Goes West* casts a sharply satirical eye on the demands and perils of assimilation. It is a masterpiece not only of Asian American literature but also of American literature.

He returns to China with a newfound hunger for human rights as he evolves from an unknown artist to a well-renowned ambitious one praised by the arts and targeted by Chinese authorities. Here, for the first time, Ai Weiwei explores the origins of his exceptional creativity and passionate political beliefs through his life story and that of his father, whose creativity was stifled.





Viktor Frankl's riveting account of his time in the Nazi concentration camps, and his insightful exploration of the human will to find meaning in spite of the worst adversity, has offered solace and guidance to generations of readers since it was first published in 1946. At the heart of Frankl's theory is a conviction that the primary human drive is the discovery and pursuit of what the individual finds meaningful.


